Course Goals and Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Recognize and identify administrative structures that support arts in health programs, specifically those at the student's practicum site.
- Demonstrate the ability to apply professional-level practices through collaboration, recognition of barriers, and implementation of decision-making and problem-solving skills in the arts in healthcare setting.
- Demonstrate advanced levels of self-directed practice evidenced by site supervisor evaluations and reporting of patient contact and administrative activities.
- Engage in critical self-reflection measured through writing and reporting assignments (Interaction Reports) and demonstrated through the development of personal approaches to arts in health (e.g., Discussion Board posts/comments, Creative Blog).
- Produce graduate level academic paper relevant to the populations at the student's Practicum Site or on a topic that the student anticipates for Capstone (MA students).

Attendance/Class Participation

HUM6942 is an asynchronous, online course. Because we do not meet in person or synchronously, your class participation grade is based on the Discussion Board participation. The goal is for students to participate in a lively discussion with respect and courtesy. As such, the instructor's expectations for class participation include but are not limited to the following:

***Your instructor understands that you do not have control over your Site Supervisor evaluation submission, but please check in to remind your Site Supervisor when the final evaluation is due, so mp points will be deducted for late submission. (Evaluation forms are sent directly to Site Supervisors. They may share with you if they wish.)

- Students are expected to participate in Discussion Boards with an initial post (80 points) and at least two comments (10 popints each). Points are deducted if two comments are not included. You may make as many comments as you wish. Discussion Boards are assigned each week of the course, except for one near the midterm..
- Please read the detailed Discussion Board <u>Guidelines</u> to better understand the expectations, requirements, and appropriate conduct for participating in Discussion Boards during this course (HUM6942).
- Excused absences must be consistent with university policies in the <u>Graduate Catalog</u> and require appropriate documentation. Additional information can be found in <u>Attendance</u> Policies.

Understanding Assignments

As a gradudate student in an asynchronous online course, you are expected to do the following:

- Prepare for and read all assignments before completing the work.
- If you require more explanation regarding an assignment, likely so do your classmates. Unless your question is of personal nature, post it on the General Discussion Board (and send a copy to the instructor). In an ansychronous online class this General Discussion Board is similar to discussing assignments with your classmates in the hallways, walking on campus, or meeting at a café.
- Ask questions about the assignments more than a week before they are due* if you require
 more explanation. Submitting late because you did not understand something will result in
 late point deductions unless you have inquired in writing at least a week before the
 assignment is due. (*The exception is for the Literature Review assignment in which inquire
 early enough so that you can submit the assignment on time.)

Late & Make-up Options

- If you turn in assignments late, points will be deducted on the following schedule, 5 points per day for the first 3 days. (Note that assignments are due at 11:59 p.m. EST/EDT, but late points begin the following morning at 8 a.m. to accommodate various time zones.)
- After three days, a cap of 20 points will be deducted from the assignment *plus* any points deducted based on the rubric for the assignment.
- If you know you will not be able to complete an assignment on time, you have the option of turning it in early.
- If you have an emergency that prohibits you from turning in an assignment on time, tell the instructor immediately and submit documentation (e.g., doctor's note, police report, job related paperwork, practicum site problem.)
- If you miss a **Discussion Board**, you can go back and create an initial post and two comments (although you will miss the class interaction), but after the three-day limit for assignments due, 20 points will be deducted, but this is preferrable to 0 for the assignment.
- Interaction Reports may be turned in late without penalty only if the fault is with the practicum site or due to a situation such as illness or weather. You must inform the instructor in writing and upload a note to the assignment with an estimated time you will turn in the assignment.

Practicum Hours

• You must complete the required practicum hours: 72 contact hours (24 hands-on hours, 48 experiential hours) and 24 administrative hours for a total of 96 hours for the course.

- Note that hands-on hours may be substituted for experiential hours, but you must reach a minimum of 24 hands-on hours. (Please see the <u>Practicum Guide for definitions of hands on and experiential hours.)</u>
- If you do not reach a total of 72 contact hours (24 hands-on and 48 experiential), your Practicum Hours Met grade for that assignment will be reduced by 2 points for each hour missed.
- If you do not reach 24 administrative hours, the grade will be reduced by 1 point for each hour missed.
- If you have extenuating circumstances that prohibit you from reaching the required hours, please discuss this with your instructor/s as soon as you recognize an issue, or at least three weeks prior to the end of the semester in order negotiate an alternative. Note that if more than 5 hands on or 5 experiential hours are missed, you may be required to make up those hours before receiving a final grade for the course.
