Course Description

This course introduces students to the principles of visual design collaboration The course focuses on working in student groups as design teams with choreographers to develop compelling dance presentations for public review as part of the Spring BFA Dance Showcase.

- Use a template to duplicate a sample object shown in the demonstration video with the application tools.

- Construct a new programmed show from the design templates
- Modify an existing show program to execute design changes

Performance Expectation. In addition to attending all classes, attendance is required at the following events for successful incorporation of class projects. A group team member must be present to represent the Team at the Unshowing 1 Presentation (Feb 24th, 2020 6:30-8:30pm). A group team member must be present to represent the Team at the Load-in to transfer the project content to the system computer (Mar 27th, 2020 evening) A group team member must be present at the Technical and Dress Rehearsals (currently scheduled the days of March 28th through the 31st, 2020). This participation is accounted under the Class Participation and Attendance Section. Late Arrival or Absence in these critically scheduled times will not be tolerated and will result in the demerit of the entire team. Times are subject to change, please check project and production calendar on regular intervals.

During certain class periods you will be asked to participate in movement exercises. These are not intended to be strenuous or athletic, but merely to show and understand the kinesthetic application of the form. Students may wish to dress in comfortable clothing suitable for movement on these days. Classes in which movement is expected will be announced in advance.

We value participation more than mere attendance. The instructor is responsible for communicating the specific details of what percentage of your grade (if any) will be assigned to participation, and how class participation will be measured and graded. Interaction with your peers and the instructor will empower you to greater achievement.

Please Note that All classes begin in the G-6 Studio and may subsequently move or be rescheduled to the computer lab as needed. Students are expected to meet on time in the G6 Studio for class meetings. A change of meeting location will be posted as a Canvas announcement.

Attendance and participation are required for this course. Attendance will be taken every class period at the time the class is scheduled to start. If a student arrives after class begins, it is their responsibility to meet with the instructor after class to notify them that they were late and would like to receive a late attendance grade.

In our course, attendance is mandatory. Students are allowed **three unexcused absences**. If you miss more than **three classes** during the semester, each additional absence will lower your overall grade by **100 points**. If you miss more than **six classes**, you will fail the course. Exempt from this policy are only those absences involving university-sponsored events, such as athletics and band, and religious holidays, family emergencies, and health issues for which **you must provide appropriate documentation in advance of the absence**.

Additionally, tardiness will not be tolerated. If you are tardy for three class periods, you will receive an unexcused absence.

Extensions on Assignments must be discussed with the instructor and approved 72 hours prior to the due date; late submissions will be penalized 9% of the grade for each 24 hours that transpires. After 72 hours the submissions will no longer be accepted and the grade will be registered at zero points.

Quizzes missed due to excused absences will be reopened in the Canvas module for the student to take at an appropriate time. If a quiz is missed due to an unexcused absence the score will be registered at zero points and there will be no opportunity for the student to make up the quiz.

Course Recordings

Our class sessions may be audio-visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live. Students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image are agreeing to have their video or image recorded. If you are unwilling to consent to have your profile or video image recorded, be sure to keep your camera off and do not use a profile image. Likewise, students who un-mute during class and participate orally are agreeing to have their voices recorded. If you are not willing to consent to have your voice recorded during class, you will need to keep your mute button activated and communicate exclusively using the "chat" feature, which allows students to type questions and comments live. The chat will not be recorded or shared. As in all courses, unauthorized recording and unauthorized sharing of recorded materials is prohibited.

Creation of Original Content Ethics

For original projects and all assignment deliverables, students should remember that representations of acts of violence, coarse and offensive language, sexual behavior, bodily function and ability, neurodiversity, and personal identity are likely to cause extreme audience response, regardless of the creator's intentions. In addition, the recreation of such actions and subjects for fictional purposes may unintentionally traumatize or negatively impact those who collaborate in the creation of the images. While the university encourages students to explore themes and tell stories that may include this difficult subject matter, they should be cautioned against modes or styles of representation that might be considered unnecessarily offensive or potentially triggering. Instructors, faculty, and university administrators reserve the right to not show or share any student work they feel is inappropriate for their classroom or for public exhibition, as there may be concerns about the impact of such work on the community. We encourage students to consult with their faculty when producing work that might be considered controversial, and to err on the side of being cautious when it comes to making decisions about a project's content - in other words, make the PG-13 version of your story, not the R version, and certainly not the "unrated" version. This is also to help students understand that most professional creative situations have strict guidelines and limitations on such content and how it is produced: your ability to tell stories effectively with "less" is a strong professional skill that will aid in the dissemination of your work to a broader audience.
