Course Description

The Music in Medicine Capstone course is the culminating course in the Undergraduate Certificate in Music in Medicine. This course provides students an opportunity to undertake individual research related to the intersections between music and health. A culminating research paper will deepen the student's understanding of music in health research and practice.

Objectives

- 1. Survey and analyze literature as it relates to utilization of music in healthcare or community settings.
- 2. Recognize and articulate theoretical foundations that inform the practice of music in health.
- 3. Explain the distinction between music in health and music therapy.
- 4. Formulate a formal research paper.

Course Format and Content

The course uses an individual contractual format for specific academic requirements. The general scope and content is as follows:

- Capstone Proposal: Develop a capstone proposal on an instructor approved topic related to music in healthcare of community settings which includes your initial goals, timeline, and expected outcomes.
- Literature Review: An in-depth, independent survey of the literature as it relates to the intersections between music and health
- Capstone Paper: Compose a paper of 1000-1500 words in APA format including an abstract, introduction, background, methods, discussion, limitations and recommendations, conclusions, and references.

<u>Assignments:</u> All written assignments should be submitted via Canvas unless other arrangements have been made with the instructor.

- <u>Late Assignment Policy</u>: Students will be given three days after the due date to make up any missed material, but there will be a grade reduction of 5% per day. In the case of extenuating circumstances, arrangements will be made on a case-by-case basis through written documentation between the student and the instructor.
- Source Citations: All assignments should be formatted in APA style, double spaced and 12 point font, such as Times New Roman or Cambria. Research must include a bibliography citing all sources used.
- <u>Grading Feedback from Instructor:</u> It is the instructor's intention to grade all assignments within 1 week of their submission. Assignments will have a rubric that the instructor will use to evaluate students' grades. Rubrics for assignments can be found directly under the assignment instructions. The instructor will potentially leave grading feedback in three places:
 - o Assignment Rubrics
 - o Submission Comments
 - o In-text annotated feedback in the text of the document submitted Students are responsible for checking all of these places to benefit from instructor feedback. Your grades may be dependent on reading this feedback and making appropriate adjustments to future assignments.

<u>Communication</u>: Each student is issued a University email address upon admittance. Students are expected to read email sent to this account on a regular basis. Failure to read and react to University communications in a timely manner does not absolve the student from knowing and complying with the content of the communication.
