Purpose of Course: In this semester of scene design, you will build and refine your artistic and technical scenography abilities through the design of various types and styles of production. The project venues will challenge you to solve the designs in a unique and innovative manner. The expectations for your design work are exceedingly high. Your designs are required to be supportive of the script, be exciting to you, and be compelling. As this is a collaborative art form, responding to discussions and critiques is a critical component towards success within this class.

Objectives- By the end of this course, students will:

- 1. Be able to produce design deliverables at a professional-level quality
- 2. Improve their depth of understanding on creating compelling design choices
- 3. Comfortably design complex, multi-scene shows

Materials, Supplies, and Software: Students will need access to a personal computer with the following software installed:

- AutoCAD- Free to students
- **Sketchup Pro** \$55/year for students or free through UFAPPS
- Keyframe Animation (Sketchup Plugin)- \$42 (permanent license) or \$20/year
- Rendering Software- Can include programs such as Podium, Capture, Lumion, etc. (students choice)
- Video editing software (I use iMovie but for the non-Mac users, anything comparable will work. Simple is best.
- Adobe Photoshop
 Adobe has a student package that includes all of their programs available for \$19.99/month or \$239.88/year or through UF Computing Help Desk for \$140/year or \$77/six months:

Students will need various model-making supplies including foam core, illustration board, Bristol board, and various other materials used to create scale replicas of their designs. The exact materials needed will vary from student to student with the design choices made for that particular project. As a student in design, the expense of art supplies is an integral and expected component of your education.

Attendance: The success of this course is based on discussion and class participation. Attendance is vital. Only one (1) unexcused absence from class will be permitted without penalty. Each additional unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 5%. Two (2) late arrivals and/or early departures to/from class will count as one (1) absence. Three unexcused absences will result in a failing grade in this class. Excused absences are consistent with university policies in the undergraduate catalog and require appropriate documentation.

The concepts and principles are presented systematically and cumulatively, with each project building on previous concepts and techniques. Therefore, attendance and punctuality are expected. If you do not have the work completed, you are expected to attend class anyway; bring to class whatever work you have done to that point. If you do miss class, it is your responsibility to make up the work missed in a timely fashion. You are responsible for all work due during the semester.

The instructor will endeavor to adhere to the course schedule/project due dates but some adjustments are likely to be required. As a project-based course, self-direction and time management are extremely important.

Critiques: Numerous times during the semester will include an in-class critique/feedback session of your materials. In our critiques, we will look at one another's work, discuss its successes and ways it can be improved. These critiques will give you a chance to present your work, develop your skill at responding to work, and learn from each other. When speaking of someone's work, your comments are expected to be respectful, honest, clear, and professional.

Grading & Expectations: Scoring design work is extremely subjective; there are no defined right or wrong solutions in this field. The grades are based on the level of achievement and accomplishments on the different aspects of your projects, the strength of the design, technical evolution and on your overall improvement, growth and commitment. Your grade will be strongly affected by your completeness, consistency and cleanliness of your design materials as well as their ability to communicate your ideas. You must be self-motivated and manage your time effectively. All deadlines are final. Students are encouraged to share ideas but you are expected to do your own work. Academic fraud or plagiarism are not acceptable and will result, at a minimum, in a zero credit for that assignment. Basic grading criteria is as follows:

- A: Compelling and solid design choices, presented professionally, well thought-out, organized
- B: Good design choices, acceptable presentation and organization, missing the last bit to push it to the next level
- C: Unclear and muddy design choices, work seems half-done, little time was taken to present the work professionally
- D: Convoluted, over-complicated design choices, missing work, un-organized, materials presented in an artless manner
- E: Lacks any clear design ideas, consistently missing work or no work completed, no thought to presentation
