Course Description:

Practical experience in theatre and dance with direct skills application.

This summer's projects will consist of hands-on experience with three productions:

- Community Health Devised Theatre Project (Summer A), Catron Booker, dir.
- I AM THE DEAD MAN (Summer B), co-production with Saudade Theatre
- Swamp Dance Festival with choreographers Mx Oops and d. Sabela Grimes

Summer projects will also include preparation for fall productions, particularly in the scenic area.

Content Disclosure:

Summer projects are curated to bring attention to content that is at once urgent and thought-provoking.

Of particular note, the script for *I AM THE DEAD MAN* is currently in development and will be available when completed. Violence is featured in the script and the fear of violence is part of the atmosphere and tone of parts of the play. While most violence is discussed or described by characters, there are moments that will be physicalized. A group interrogation scene where characters are held at gunpoint will be physicalized. A prop AK-47 rifle and two prop revolvers are pivotal to the meaning and symbolism of the work. The rehearsal process will require significant discussions of sexual trauma, trafficking, traumatic violence, and war as it pertains to the script/story.

Course Objective:

Students will learn the importance of individual roles and how the collaboration between areas is essential in realizing theatre and dance productions. Objectives specific to each area will be provided on Canvas by Monday, May 10, 2021.

Textbooks:

There are no required textbooks. Playscripts will be provided based on assignments.

Weekly Course Schedule

The weekly schedule is determined by the project supervisor. Some projects allow for flexible scheduling to be arranged in advance with the supervisor. For many projects, individual time management is the responsibility of the student. Students must start or confirm their work shifts by the start of the term, May 9, 2022.

- Rehearsal times are typically Mon-Sat, 1pm-6pm.
- Shop work hours are typically Mon-Fri, 10am-Noon and/or 1pm-3pm. Students completing assignments in the shops will also need to participate in evening crew calls.

Attendance:

Success in this course is based on participation, and other students are often dependent upon you to successfully do their work. Attendance is vital. In addition to meeting the total hours requirement for this course, it is important that you show up for rehearsals, meetings, and shop hours as scheduled. Changes to your schedule should be discussed with your area supervisor in advance.

Your first unexcused absence is permitted without penalty. The second unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 5%. The third unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 15%. The fourth unexcused absence will lower your final grade by 30%. Two (2) late arrivals and/or early departures to/from class will count as one (1) absence. Excused absences are consistent with university policies in the undergraduate catalog.

Assignments and Grading

A minimum of 75 hours of crew/shop assignment is required. Each student will work the shop supervisor to confirm their specific assignments and expectations.

THE 4950 is graded with the awarding of a letter grade. Project supervisors and shop TAs will provide input for the final grading based on direct observation of student performance. Information on current UF grading policies for assigning grade points may be found at:

Grading evaluation is based upon the following: promptness, attendance, effort, ability to complete assigned tasks, adherence to safety procedures, positive collaborations with the ensemble, arriving in appropriate attire for rehearsals or shops, and overall quality of work. Each rehearsal or shop may establish guidelines for expected demeanor and work performance. Failure to arrive on time for a crew call, strike, performances or rehearsals, as well as unexcused absences, will significantly impact the final grade.

A = Excellent. Demonstrates a desire to learn and develop skills. Takes interest and initiative in planning, executing, and completing assignments. Displays an interest and ability to work with minimal supervision. Consistently available for job assignments that require performance above and beyond the minimum requirements.

B = Above Average. Learns from job assignments. Demonstrates knowledge of rehearsal techniques and/or shop equipment and facilities procedures. Takes interest and initiative in participating in rehearsal or lab activities. Displays a collaborative and positive demeanor.

C = Average. Attends all scheduled rehearsals, labs and performances on time. Is properly dressed for the work environment. Observes all safety rules and completes assignments satisfactorily.

D = Not available. Does not constitute a passing grade for School of Theatre and Dance majors.

E = Failure. Failure to complete the minimum number of required hours. Pattern of tardiness and lack of preparation. Disregard for other collaborators. Negligence in regard to safety procedures. Failure to meet established project deadlines. Work completed in an unacceptable manner. Failure to complete the minimum number of require hours will result in failure of the course, regardless of whether or not other criteria have been met.

Recording:

instructors will announce at the top of class, rehearsals, lab sessions if there is a need to record. Class sessions may be audio visually recorded for students to refer back and for students who are unable to attend live.
