

# **ARH 2531: Introduction to Asian Art**

### **Course Description**

This course provides a survey of the art and architecture of Asia from the earliest times to the present, focusing primarily on China, India, Japan, and Korea. Students will investigate how art objects have functioned within a wide range of social, political, and religious contexts. As an introductory art history course, emphasis will be placed on developing the skills of formal analysis and critical interpretation of art objects.

### **Course Objectives**

- To identify the major forms, actors, and episodes of Asian art and architecture
- To describe works of art both formally and historically
- To comprehend different approaches to and definitions of art across time
- To understand artworks as objects that not only reflect but also produce history
- To develop skills of close reading, visual analysis, active listening and engaged discussion

### **Graded Work:**

Attendance is required for this class, and students are expected to come to class having completed all required readings and prepared to participate in engaged discussions.

- Discussion Posts: 10%

Whenever a required reading or viewing is due, please use the Discussion page on Canvas to post 3–5 bullet points indicating your initial thoughts on the material or questions you are left with. These will provide a foundation for our in-class conversation.

- 4 Quizzes: 20% (5% each)

Short quizzes will be given in weeks 3, 5, 7, and 13 for the purpose of ensuring students are keeping up to speed with vocabulary and iconography essential to the study of Asian art. The content that will appear on these quizzes will be clearly flagged in the lectures.

- Midterm: 20%

The midterm will have two components: an in-class portion that will be take place during our normal class period on Tuesday, March 10. A second, take-home portion involving more open-ended and creative prompts will be distributed the same week and students will have until Sunday, March 15 to complete and submit it via Canvas.

- Final Exam: 15%

The final exam will be in-person in format. The date, time, and placed will be announced in class.

- Exhibition Design: 20%

The final project requires students to conceptualize a fictional exhibition incorporating art objects from different times and places covered in the course under a unifying theme. Details will be provided in class.
