Course Description:

In this course you will learn how to create short form movement-based films in documentation, documentary, narrative, and conceptual styles. Your film projects will be supported by daily hands-on activities including framing subjects, creating scenes, filming shot types and camera angles, performing camera movement, and editing. The course is designed progressively so that every skill leads to the next. After each exercise is completed, you will build on that foundational skill in the next.

Objectives/Learning Outcomes:

- Produce well-composed moving images.
- Demonstrate skill filming subjects in every scale and angle, eliminating the idea of movement as being frontal.
- Perform steady and well-planned camera movement.
- Edit footage in a way that supports the trajectory of the film.
- Choose and sync appropriate sound elements with your film.
- Combine learned skills and sensibilities to create material that could be used for online promotions, performance trailers, short-form teaser documentaries, and dance films.

Procedure:

- Camera experiments and exercises followed by field activities.
- Discussions of movement-based films as supporting material.
- Partnered activities for feedback and workshopping.
- Editing exercises in iMovie.

Digital Design Second Semester Itinerary and assignments:

Editing:

- Importing clips onto desktop computer, titling, creating libraries and projects in iMovie.
- Learning dance-on-camera editing techniques...primarily cutting on action and transferring energy.
- Linear and Montage Phrase editing assignment using final footage from last semester (Graded Projects 20 points).

Conceptual Development of Individual Film Projects and Cinedance Assignment:

- Storyboarding (location, subject, movement, costumes, sound, etc.).
- Planning shot lists.
- Filming and Editing Cinedance Projects (Graded Project 10 points).

Final Project of the Year:

- Class will vote on second Cinedance, dance reels, or group project. It is designed to serve your goals, and it doesn't have to be unanimous. There can be different projects going on simultaneously (Graded Project 10 points).

The remaining 10 points will be for checkmark assignments and exercises. This semester it is paramount that you attend class sessions or makeup material with other students as we will be learning hands-on skills in the lab. Like last semester, I will communicate lab days and project days. You will need the computers in the lab often this semester.
