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COURSE OBJECTIVES

To strive for excellence in comedy writing and performance. You will create and perform late night monologue material, a standup set, and sketch material all of which will be collected into your comedy writing packet.

EXPECTATIONS

This class is a space where you respect, support, and encourage your fellow performers/writers while understanding that constructive criticism is more valuable than praise. I will not censor work in this class. The only standard is whether the work is funny and chooses targets that are worthy of comic examination. There is only one absolute and unbreakable rule – you do not steal jokes.

Each week you will hand in a writing assignment such as late-night jokes, stand-up material, and sketches. Rewriting material is just as important as your first attempt. In class, you are expected to perform your own work and the work of your peers as well as improvise scenes to generate ideas for sketches. In addition to writing assignments and in-class activities, you will write and perform:

- a late-night comedy show segment(s)
- a stand-up set (a “tight five”)
- a sketch comedy show

At certain times during the semester, you may need to make time outside of class to meet with me about your material.

REQUIRED TEXTS

Mastering Stand-Up: The Complete Guide to Becoming a Successful Comedian by Stephen Rosenfield. I will also provide handouts if needed.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

This is a class *about* participation – attendance is a given. **You are expected to arrive ON TIME and to attend ALL classes.** If you feel you cannot make this commitment, please drop the class. When you work in teams, missing class hurts your peers.

Any absence from class for the following reasons must be supported by official documentation to avoid a grade penalty: serious family emergencies, special curricular requirements (e.g., judging trips, field trips, professional conferences), military obligation severe weather conditions,

participation in official university activities such as music performances, athletic competition or debate, court-imposed legal obligations (e.g., jury duty or subpoena). Religious observances do not require documentation. However, you need to let me know by the second week of classes which religious observances will impact your attendance.

Students are allowed ONE unexcused absence that does not require documentation and does not conform to the UF “acceptable reasons for absence.” Afterwards, each unexcused absence will result in a penalty of a full letter grade (10%) deducted from your final grade. Weddings, travel, job interviews, non-UF auditions, and other life events do not count as excused absences. If you have a logistical problem that will prevent you from arriving on time, see me immediately.

Any student that acquires THREE absences (either excused or unexcused) will be required to meet with me to discuss your continued participation in the course. For Majors: Failure to attend this meeting will result in Artistic Probation.

- Has clear comic targets (standup)/Follows a clear premise (sketches)
- Work is properly formatted
- Work is turned in on time

(Each category is graded from 1-5 [5 is the highest]. The total is then multiplied by 5 for a letter grade.)

- Material is memorized
- Material is properly rehearsed
- Forms relationship with audience
- Supports other performers
